





New Fiscal Models


- New budget model still in the works
 - Seems like IRB model another year or two out so we are in holding pattern
- Service Delivery Initiative teams are still moving forward
 - More centralization
- Graduate Assistantships
 - ▶ UNL support of tuition (eg tuition waivers and health costs) will go away.
 - Grant funded assistantships will be expected to cover complete cost.
 - SNR (state) funded assistantships will be reduced because those funded in house will also have to cover tuition.
 - Timeline—we do not know, but likely phased in over next year or two.
 - I predict that UNL will be pushing model that looks like UK MSc model for graduate education.
